Currently we have about 23 volunteers from all across the county and Canada working on the marriage index project. If you would like to be a part of this project, we can always use more help.

For those new to the TIGS list, the Troy Irish Genealogy Society is working on a major new project of automating the Rensselaer County Marriage Index. This 10 Volume Marriage Index of Rensselaer County marriages from 1908 to 1935 has over 60,000 names.

Work is now being done on Volume I which has 5,000 marriages which translates into 10,000 names. The original pages are scanned by TIGS members and the resulting pdf files are then sent to the volunteers working on the project as an attachment to a email along with an Excel spreadsheet for data entry.

The first scanning of the source documents covered Brides and Grooms records with the letters A., B. and C. The data for these records is now 99.9% finished and proof read. This part of the index had 1,848 names which is almost 20% of the total file of 10,000 names.

A second scanning session was held last Friday and all the Brides and Grooms records for the letters D. through K. were finished. We now have quite a few files that can be sent to the current volunteers plus any new helpers.

Hello! Thank you for the kind welcome.

As Lizette said, I am researching the HUSSEY surname in the Troy/Waterford area.

Patrick Hussey, born in Galway Ireland came to the states in 1852 with his mother, Margaret (Loftus), brother John, and sister Bridget. They joined their father, Peter, who had arrived two years earlier, and their grandfather John who had come before that. Patrick joined the NY 22nd Volunteer Infantry when he was only 16, served for the duration of the Unit, and was wounded in the Battle of the 2nd Bull Run. He was taken into the home of a US Senator to recuperate. The wound to his hand left him disabled. He applied and received a Military Pension which was on his death transferred to his wife. in 1869 he married Emily Van Norden. Patrick was a machinist foreman at the Watervliet Iron Works, he fell from a scaffold and died in hours. Patrick and Emily are buried in the Waterford Rural Cemetery, NY.

Ruth's Recipe for Codfish Cakes is just right.

My Salt Cod from the Vermont Country Store arrived a few weeks back but we had to find a weekend when we could hydrate the Cod on Saturday and make and cook the cakes for Sunday supper.

Well, I want you to know that I made them up and the eating of them took me back 50 years or so to the last time my grandmother served them up. They tasted just the same. I halved the recipe and we still ended up with 6 cakes - enough for two meals. We even managed to find B&M Baked Beans and Brown Bread at Krogers here in Ohio so the repast was complete!

Thanks again to Ruth for the recipe, which I include again with this post in case you missed it when originally posted back in September.

Ruth's recipe:

Cod Fish Cakes Recipe

Cod fish cakes are a great duo with beans. Also, a little brown bread would be yummy.

1 lb. of salt cod

4 large potatoes peeled and cut in quarters

3 eggs

1/3 cup of parsley finely chopped

1 tbsp. of onion finely chopped

1/2 tsp. black pepper

Soak cod fish overnight. The next day pour off old water and add new enough to cover the fish. Bring fish to a boil (and cook 10 minutes). This reduces the amount of salt in the fish. If after the water boils the fish is still salty change the water and boil again. Meanwhile cook the potatoes until tender. Mash the cod and the potatoes together. Add the eggs, parsley, onion, and pepper mix this well.

Shape into balls and flatten out to the shape of a patty. Fry them in oil until golden brown all over. Drain on paper towels.

P.S. If the mix is to moist use flour to dry it up but to much you want them a little moist. If the mix is to dry use another egg to add moisture.

I am a cousin of the author Loretta Nial; I am the person who transcribed her book, "Tombstone Inscriptions in Cemeteries in Troy, Rensselaer County, New York Indicating a Foreign Place of Origin" to be put on Pat Connor's web sites."

3. Comments on Tombstone Inscriptions book and Crowe/Niall Families :

"The reason these names were included is that they are our family lines. The many members of Crowe family who emigrated to upstate NY were born in and emigrated from the Emly area, particularly Bransha/Breansha (the spelling has varied in records), the townland just outside the main village.

I do not believe Emly was mentioned on their tombstones, but Loretta wanted to ensure our family connection was in the book for the future generations of researchers. They all were VERY proud of being "Emly Tipps!"

Is there a source of early marriages before 1910 in the Troy area other than churches? I have not had any responses from St. Henry's Catholic church where ANNA WACTEL's family attended and are buried although I have sent a donation of \$20 each time I write. The check gets cashed of course. ANNA MARGARET WACHTEL and JOHN H. MARTIN were probably married about 1903. I am only guessing about them being married at St. Henry's.

I am pretty sure they would have married in a Catholic church as she was a devoted Catholic all her life. Her family lived in Sand Lake. Her parents were PETER and CATHERINE (DESSOM) WACHTEL and she was born 17 March 1876. JOHN reportedly went to the Alaskan gold fields and returned to New York expecting to marry a sister of ANNA's. She had already married another so he married ANNA. He then went to Seattle and ANNA followed with 2 young boys THEODORE ROOSEVELT MARTIN and JOHN A.

MARTIN between 1907-08 when JOHN was born and April 15, 1910 when the whole family is listed in the 1910 Seattle, Washington census. JOHN H.

MARTIN could have been back and forth between Troy and Seattle in the interim. THEODORE was born 25 March 1904 and JOHN A. was 2 in 1910. I would appreciate any help anyone on the list could offer about this family.

I was able to validate my suspicions by finding my Great Great Grandfathers obituary from records of press releases at The Troy Public Library. He died the same date as the person listed as Marjorie in our family plot, Dec 7, 1872. When requesting internment records, the first attempt I was told they did not have records prior to 1890. I then returned a month later requesting records for my Great Grandfather who passed on 12/28/1907, I was again told those records could not be located. I have 11 family members in 2 different plots at Saint Peters in unmarked graves, so any information from them would help me. Ultimately I am trying to determine what part/town in Ireland my family emigrated from. From what I have come to believe is that the internment records would provide place of birth. My experience with St.Peters was mixed. With dates they did find our family plot and sent me a list of all buried there, which was most helpful. However, they did not have the ages of our Irish grandparents nor the place in Ireland they came from nor their parents names. After 20 yrs, I still have not found verification of the names I received from a paid Genealogist (in this country, nor in Ireland) the Troy death records also did not have the information although I now know their approximate ages. (Whoever makes out the death information may not have known the exact location in Ireland nor their parent's name and ages) So, a brick wall! Also in St. Peter's I was informed the cemetery fees were never paid and therefore our family owed several hundred dollars back fees. We paid the fees, and received the cemetery list. Our approx. years were 1880-1920.

Before the upcoming holiday whirl begins next week with its demands on time and attention, here's some genealogical news that you may want to note for next spring.

The Ballykilcline Society will hold its annual Reunion in Albany, NY and Rutland, VT from June 25-27, 2006 with a line-up of great speakers. The Society will welcome local genealogists who are NOT members to all or part of the planned events, which will take place at the College of Saint Rose in Albany on Sunday, June 25, the Holiday Inn Turf in Albany and the Rutland Holiday Inn the following day, and the Rutland Holiday Inn on Tuesday, June 27.

The speakers in Albany will include Ruth-Ann Harris of Boston College's Irish Studies program, who is a historian and lead editor of the well-known Missing Friends book series which presents immigrants' Boston Pilot ads for lost family members; John J. McEneney, New York State legislator and former Albany County historian; and Jeannie O'Keefe, webmaster and a founding member of the Troy Irish Genealogical Society. In Rutland, the main speaker will be Michael Austin of Castleton College, whose doctoral dissertation dealt with Rutland's Irish immigrant history.

The Ballykilcline Society is a non-profit international organization which aims to trace the histories of the tenant farmers evicted from a townland near Strokestown in County Roscommon during 1847 and 1848 and to foster the local history of that part of Ireland, especially during the early and middle 1800s. The Ballykilcline rent strike, evictions, and forced emigration of several hundred people were the subjects of historian Robert Scally in his 1995 book, *The End of Hidden Ireland*. For 40 years, Ballykilcline was part of the Mahon estate in Strokestown where Ireland's Famine Museum is now located. Many immigrants "assisted" from the Mahon estate died at Grosse Ile in Quebec during the calamity there in the summer of 1847. The Society's web site, which lists the Ballykilcline evictees by name, is at www.ballykilcline.com; annual membership is \$15 a year. Previous Reunions have been held in Ireland, Canada, and the U.S.

The Society has learned that dozens of immigrants from Ballykilcline settled in or stayed for a time in Rutland, which had social, commercial, and economic contacts with Troy and Albany due to proximity, connecting rail lines, markets, and so forth. At least two TIGS members (Lynne Sisk and Mary Lee Dunn) are very active in the Society.

This event should be of interest to anyone whose ancestors came out of Famine Ireland. This notice is a heads-up. Further information will be posted after the holidays when the Reunion registration period begins.

The death dates that they gave me were accurate and I was able to order the death certificates. The death certificates that I've ordered do not have the name of the town in Ireland. I've also ordered internment lists from two cemeteries in NY and they only provided the country name -- Ireland --- but no town reference.

I did find that a "James Langton" (presumably my great-great grandfather) emigrated from Ireland from Dublin from a list on the TIGS site.

I find that looking at naturalization and alien declaration records at the county clerk's office is the better way in finding the place in Ireland, not all the time but every once in awhile they list a village instead of just Ireland. In the case of cemetery records you just get the death dates most of the time. I also check the death dates in the newspapers of the time and see what is listed in their obit Another source I have come across is baptismal records listing the godparents which are probably relatives you might try tracking them in naturalization/alien records.

On a recent trip to Quebec I unfortunately did not reserve ahead to go to Grosse Ile and the trip was filled when we tried to buy tickets. I did however purchase "Grosse Ile/ Gateway to Canada 1832-1937", by Marianna O'Gallagher.

Grosse Ile served as a quarantine station for European immigrants during many outbreaks of cholera and other diseases. In 1847-1848 most of the immigrants were from Ireland, being forced into leaving and arriving suffering from Typhus mainly.

The book contains an alphabetical list of orphans in the Catholic Orphanage of Quebec in 1847. There are 619 names and also the names of the people who adopted them. The information is as follows; name, age, date of entry, father and mother if known, parish, county and vessel if known and adopted by.

Many in lieu of "adopted by" states died or returned to family.

The book has several other incomplete lists; vessels at the Ile in July 1847 and a list of 159 names of people who died at the Isle hospital from the 1st of May 1847 with their age, vessel they arrived on, from where, date of admission and date of death, disease and what happened to their property (this is by date of death, not alphabetical).

If you are fairly certain that you had family come into Canada during this time period I would be happy to do a look up for you. Since it is the holidays and I am involved in several transcription projects, I would ask that you only ask for a look up if you think there is a possibility of connection and then have patience as I have a turkey to cook and family to feed.

It's too bad you missed Grosse Ile, Kris. It is well worth a visit. There is a memorial wall there with the names of the dead engraved on something like plexiglass so that as you stand reading the names, you see the rows of small white crosses in the graveyard behind the wall. Many buildings still survive on the island as well.

Another book with names from Grosse Ile is A Register of Deceased Persons at Sea and on Grosse Ile in 1847 by Andre Charbonneau and Doris Drolet-Dube, which has been put out by Parks Canada. It lists the people who died at the island's hospitals, in quarantine on ship, or on the passage across the Atlantic to Grosse Ile. The info generally includes the individual's name and age, the vessel on which they traveled, the port and country from which they embarked and the date of death (actual or approximate). The book lists thousands of people.

For example, Denis Mahon of Strokestown in Roscommon paid passage for nearly 1,000 of his evicted tenants in the dreadful summer of 1847. More than half of them died en route or on the island. Their names are listed on the memorial wall and, since the names of his chartered ships are known, you can, for the most part, tell which people were his tenants. In addition, in April 1848, the bishop of Elphin listed the names of more than 600 heads of households (which totaled about 3,000 people) evicted by Mahon in a letter to the Freeman's Journal, a prominent Irish newspaper. In some cases, you can trace individuals from the bishop's list to their deaths at Grosse Ile and then what happened to their children in O'Gallagher's list of orphans. The death rates that summer were highest aboard some of Mahon's ships and Canadian authorities filed vigorous protests with the British. Many of these evicted tenants of Mahon's were the relatives and friends of the people evicted from Ballykilcline (whose story is told in Robert Scally's book The End of Hidden Ireland). It was only a few months after Mahon's tenants landed in Quebec in such desperate circumstances that Mahon was assassinated in November 1847.

It is Denis Mahon's estate at Strokestown where Ireland's Famine Museum is now located and an extensive archive of the estate records (tenancy and labor agreements etc) exists at both the museum and manor house and at the National Library of Ireland.

FYI, if you know who your family's landlord is AND if you learn that records from that estate are at the National Library of Ireland, it is possible to custom order copies of those records from the library. The Ballykilcline Society has been doing this for several years for the Mahon estate, which leased Ballykilcline from the 1790s until 1834.

purchase "Grosse Ile/ Gateway to Canada 1832-1937", by Marianna O'Gallagher. Grosse Ile served as a quarantine station for European immigrants during many outbreaks of cholera and other diseases. In 1847-1848 most of the immigrants were from Ireland, being forced into leaving and arriving suffering from Typhus mainly. The book contains an alphabetical list of orphans in the Catholic Orphanage of Quebec in 1847. There are 619 names and also the names of the people who adopted them. The information is as follows; name, age, date of entry, father and mother if known, parish, county and vessel if known and adopted by.

Many in lieu of "adopted by" states died or returned to family. The book has several other incomplete lists; vessels at the Ile in July 1847 and a list of 159 names of people who died at the Isle hospital from the 1st of May 1847 with their age, vessel they arrived on, from where, date of admission and date of death, disease and what happened to their property (this is by date of death, not alphabetical). If you are fairly certain that you had family come into Canada during this time period I would be happy to do a look up for you. Since it is the holidays and I am involved in several transcription projects, I would ask that you only ask for a look up if you think there is a possibility of connection and then have patience as I have a turkey to cook and family to feed.

I haven't gone much further than Michael Curran's 1947 death certificate, obituary and census enumerations, plus some family stories.

He was born in Ballyhale, Headford, Galway, Ireland, I believe. Later I think his family ran Curran's Pub in Galway. Now I think it is O'Malley's.

He was the son of Mathias Curran and Mary McHugh of Ballyhale. He married Mary Nolan, dau of Martin Nolan and Catherine Murphy.

He came to America with his brother Patrick, before 1888. In 1952 Patrick died intestate, which is the reason that relatives in Ireland are known by name and place.

I found Michael J. Curran in Troy in the 1892-93 city directory, listed as a puddler, boarding at 544 Fourth St., Troy. In 1901-02 his occupation was ironworker.

In the 1920 Census Michael Curran is listed as naturalized in 1888. That would probably have been in New York City, since his granddaughters say the couple were married in St. Patrick's Church, New York City, on a Fourth of July, perhaps 1889. Of course the geography changes if the marriage occurred upstate instead.

The Ballykilcline evictees are not the same group as Mahon's evictees. By the time of the Famine, the Mahons no longer leased Ballykilcline; it belonged to the queen of England and was run by British Crown authorities. The Crown evicted the people there.

Approximately 500 people lived in Ballykilcline, which was in Kilglass Parish, and the Crown sent about 368 of them to New York, paying their way.

Just about the same time, Denis Mahon evicted 3,000 people from his estate, which consisted of townlands in Kilglass Parish and around Strokestown. The people named in the bishop's letter were the heads of those households. Mahon paid passage for about 980 of them to go to Quebec in the summer of 1847. From several records on Mahon's emigration (both from the estate and from Grosse Ile), it appears that more than 500 of them died aboard ship, in quarantine at Grosse Ile, or in the island's hospitals.

The two groups of evictees, however, likely consisted of friends and relatives, and until 1834 Ballykilcline was part of the Mahon estate, which had leased it from the Crown for forty years.

Does that help? Are your Cooneys from Roscommon? If so, I'll search other records that I have to see whether Cooneys are listed. I know I've seen the name in Roscommon. You also may want to search for Cooneys in the archive at Ed Finn's Leitrim-Roscommon web site at www.leitrim-roscommon.com.

You are right, Alethea. The ones who got out before the Famine were the lucky ones. The whole economic and social landscape during and just before the Famine was very chaotic and extremely hard on the Irish people.

In the case of Roscommon, many landlords were trying to break the traditional practices re land use to convert their properties to more lucrative grazing lands, which required far fewer laborers. So jobs for the Irish became scarce. In addition, the way they leased land also was changing. Landlords were trying to "rationalize" their holdings -- that is, break the customary rundale traditions and reconfigure their estates into neat, square parcels and then re-let them. Some of the largest land agents in Ireland were advocating doing this.
