This is a copy of a previous message from September 2004. There are two more I will send along. Please forgive the typos. The original was written after the nine hour drive home from Albany. The numbers in front of the names are the burial numbers and then the location in the plot.

A few days ago I went to Oakwood Cemetery in Troy, New York tom look for Mary McCabe Trulan's grave. I hoped it would provide a clue to her place of birth in Ireland as many memorials do. I was disappointed but did find the following information. There are three Trulan plots purchased over an eight month period. Many of the stones have fallen over and were unreadable. I did get a list of the interments in each plot and cleaned off Robert and Mary's fallen stone. There are three plots but I will send them one at a time over the next several days.

The format of the information is: The buyer's name, residence (which is not on all of the entries), Section, lot, date purchased, amount paid (appears in some), size, burial number; grave number, age. The date of burial is not given.

A few months ago I joined your discussion group because my grandparents were from Troy, even though I did not think I had Irish ancestors. Now I think I may have found one, so perhaps there is someone out there with more clues.

Charlotte, whose last name I think was Cookingham, became the second wife of Israel Striker (1787-1863) in the early 1850s. There is conflicting evidence as to Charlotte's birth date (1816, 1828) and as to the birthplace of her mother (NY and Ireland).

To give you researchers more clues and perhaps find something that rings a bell, I will add that Charlotte and Israel had two children together, Mary and Anna (1857-1915). Anna married Murray Paul Campbell.

I now think that in the picture that is presently on the website, in the front row, are Mabel Campbell Jordan (daughter of Murray Paul Campbell), Murray Paul Campbell, Anna Striker Campbell (his wife), their two other daughters, Matilda and Charlotte, and two of their three sons, Paul and/or Striker and/or Clarkson.

Any of us who have done census transcription know how hard it is to read the old handwriting and if the pages are dark or in bad condition, the job becomes even more difficult.

So, my recommendation, Mike, is this. Don't just look for one name. If you can get other siblings, it would help. I have two experiences.

While my ggrandfather and his sister's death certificates say both were born in County Tipperary, I could find her baptism but not his. Later, I did find a descendant of another sibling who is buried in the O'Connor plot at St Josephs so I am sure this family in Tipperary RC parish is mine, and evidently my ggrandfather's name was put in the computer with a different last name. Now, since they are from the Emly & Cashel Diocese, there is no way to look at the film because the bishop won't allow it, but that is what I would do, if I could.

My other quandry is my Flynn family. I have my ggrandmother and four siblings. One family says they were from County Leitrim and one says County Leix. So, I commissioned both county heritage centres. Co Leix came back negative but there are many RC parishes among the missing.

County Leitrim found four siblings but not Hugh. They found Mary, Bridget, James and Anne all born about the same as our census records.

I am not convinced this is our family because almost every Irish family had a Mary, Bridget, James and Anne but very few had Hugh. I now have that film at my LDS Family History Library. It is in horrible condition, and first look shows that the years around Hugh's birth are missing! I am still going to search the film page by page and see what I find.

So, is the saga of doing research in Ireland.

They were forced to "share crop" it for many years. Some were killed for teaching the children to read and speak "the language". Some of them came to the US in search of a better life before the fammin. Several died due to the fammin. Still more were shipped to Canada curtesy of Lord Palmerton who managed "their" property, and a "coffin ship" . Several of those died enroute. Family quotes are that they barley had enough fabirc left in their clothing to coverthemselves. Of those that made it here there were 1.those that clung dearly to the old ways refusing to build a new life living only in the past and never able to cope with the horrors they had lived. Many of those "lived and died with the bottle" 2. Others to the opposite extreme refused to be associated with their past changed their names to be less irish and moved on. Very difficult to find these. 3. In the middle were those that have always held dear their origin of Irish with took jobs in and around the iron furnaces in Southern Ohio and Kentucky. Drew their strength from each other and God. They worked as a family unit. This includes what some would call extended family. They sent money home and worked to bing others remaining over. Some also supported "political organizations" in the old country. They worked to become involved in

politics here, and build strong irish american communities They learned the language in their new home. Not quite the same as the one they were forced to speak in "the old country." A mutated version to include expressions and words from the languages of others that had started over here.

There are people from many differnt origins of decent whose stories are the same. We have become a great nation because we have interwoven. Holding with pride to our origin yet reaching for a better future. Becoming United.

Now I have given my 2 cents worth or malarky which ever way you want to view it.

The lively discussion of immigration prompts me to ask if anyone has done research on how the famine Irish traveled to reach upstate NY, especially some of the less obvious routes. I believe my ancestor came to St. John, New Brunswick on a ship named Midas in 1847 and I have a record of his being employed in Washington County in 1853. I don't find him on any of the NY or Boston passenger lists so I wonder how he found his way to the upstate area. Someone suggested that people literally hiked. So I am interested in what anyone may have learned on the subject.

By the way, this man, John Nevins, went to court to declare his intent to become a citizen in 1858 with a brother or cousin and was naturalized in 1860 shortly before his marriage. He left a newborn at home to volunteer for the Army and was wounded by artillery fire in the slaughter at Fredericksburg and became part of the Invalid Corps, working in a military hospital in Washington DC. He never fully recovered from his wounds and died a few years after the war after a wild July 4th parade. Many, many Irish never it made off the battlefield.

I have a real brick-wall situation regarding my gggrandmother, Catherine Callinan (Callanan?) Bronk, who emigrated from Ireland in either 1847...during th famine....or 1844 (It's hard to make out the date on the 1920 US Census). She was born in 1836...and her father's name was Mortimer. She married by gggrandfather, Philip John Bronk, about 1853...and had 7 children (Elizabeth, Louise, Frances, John Mortimer, Edwin Serviss, Emma & Wilbert John). She died on 7 Aug 1923 at the age of 87...at Watervliet, NY. I would love to know where Catherine was born and raised in Ireland...so I could visit that area. The 1920 Census also shows that she was naturalized in 1869...but I have researched every organization (county, state & federal courts)I could think of which would have her naturalization documents...and no one knows of her.

Further research on the subject of naturalization revealed that most women during that time were naturalized automatically because of their marriage to an American. If that's the case, there wouldn't be a formal naturalization.

But then, why would the Census indicate a specific date? Perhaps I'm missing something. Any direction would be appreciated.

The first time I see Charles J Fox is on the 1880 Census. He is living with his sister, Bridget Ryan, a widow on Water Street, in Troy. His age is listed as 32. Bridget has 4 children, the oldest being 9 yrs old from a previous marriage to a Murphy. The 1900 census has 1865 as Charles' year of immigration. I have no idea where he lived from 1865 to 1880.

I cannot find any information on Bridget after the 1880 census. No one in the descendents know where in Ireland they came from.

Christopher and Mary Fitzsimmons King and their daughter arrived in the States around 1853-1855. I have the 1855 NY census in North Greenbush with Christopher, age 35, Mary, age 30, Margaret, age 3, Christopher, age 1 and Mary, age 2/12 months. Christopher and Mary were born in NY. I cannot find Margaret in the 1870 census and assume she either married or died before the census. The other children- Christopher married Margaret Brearton 1/8/1882, Mary married Charles Fox 7/3/1881 and another daughter, Catherine married Thomas Hines. Christopher and Margarets youngest daughter, Esther married Thomas Delaney. I do not know any King descendents to ask them if they have any info rmation.

I haven't devoted much time to William C Myers. He was born in Troy, NY around 1850. His parents came from Ireland. He married Ellen or Helen McClernand. She was born in Glasgow, Scotland but her father, William

McClernand was born in Ireland. I have an 1880 census for William.

I know that Catherine Larkin came from Seefin, Ireland in 1904. She married George Vaughan. I visited Seefin and found cousins named Murphy in Ireland.

She's living with daughters Louise & Emma. Unfortunately the 1900 census (online thru Ancestry) has massive ink stains covering the Bronk family in Watervliet. I can see Catherine, Louise, Emma, & Wilbert, but most of the rest is obliterated. I tried looking on other online services but cannot find them, even though I tried many spellings. (Ancestry is the best way to look for alternate forms of names).

The 1880 census of Watervliet also says she was born in NY, parents born Ireland. So, it's difficult to know what information is accurate. I would suggest the following:

- * Get a copy of her death certificate, her obit, and gravestone information
- * Try the 1855 and 1865 state censuses, which list counties of birth if born in NY state. These are not indexed...

It would help if you knew if she had siblings. By the way, both those censuses would place her birth year c. 1833...a little earlier than what you have, but those dates are never written in stone!

Callanan (with the 'a' and not the 'i') can be found in Co. Galway, but probably other counties, too. David's suggestion is a good one.

The 1850 census is one that HeritageQuest (the census I can access from home) hasn't indexed, so I can't find the family without going through the census, page by page...a daunting task! If someone has Ancestry, they could try to locate Mortimer and family in the 1850 census. Probably not much info on that early census, but you never know. Of course, there's also the possibility that Mortimer didn't come to the States...that Catherine came over with other relatives. Good luck. Terry in Michigan

I went and spent the 60 (~\$84) euro on a search at the Mallow Heritage Center in Cork. From the various internet forums I have read I must say I think I got my moneys worth when compared to some other folks. I did however provide them with a specific town land and ages, with parents names. They gave me baptismal info on my Great grandmother born in Cork in 1867 and most (6) of her siblings. They then also gave me the same info for the father Thomas Mahoney- the siblings (5 of them) born to his parents- but not him. It also gave the town land of the parents of the newborns- which gave me 2 additional places to look. NO info was found for either marriages.

They said a search was carried out for Mahoney in the ONE town land in the 1901 and 1911 census and was "negative", but that would be for a spot of land about the size of my yard. I was disappointed they would not look through adjoining townlands or the whole parish. It must not be indexed like the birth records. I will have to order the LDS films for that. NO mention of any other records that they mention on their site- eg Tithe Applotment books, etc. I had already found the family in Griffith's and had told them where, so they did not mention that source either.

No mention of searching for the mothers names- which in both cases, GG and GGGgrandmother- I provided with last names- I guess that is on another dime.

However the report presentation, in MS word, was very awkward and bland. Spaced weird and hard to read. I would gladly forward the report to anyone who may wish to see how the information is presented, if interested.

As far as timeliness I would give them an 'A'. It took only about 2 weeks. Very gratifying to the genealogically neurotic. All in all, I would do it again.

Has anyone used the Roscommon (Roscommon Roots) or Westmeath (Du Ni Si ?) Heritage centers? We have a great uncle, WILLIAM MARTIN REYNOLDS, who died in Colonie about the same time as your great grandfather, and although we have his death certificate, and cemetery papers to show that he is buried in St. Mary's, Troy, that's IT!! We have yet to find an obituary of any sort, nor a death notice in the papers. He was 25 and is reported to have died of heart trouble.

The family lived in Green Island when they first came to the U. S., in 1882.

In the late 1890's, they moved to what was called CRANDALL LANE, off the Cohoes Rd. I think Crandall La. must have been what is now Elm St., as Crandall La. is not in the Street Listings section at the same time that Elm St.

"appears" in the city directory , and names formerly on Crandall La. are then on Elm St. So the family lived "in the area" where Colonie (Maple Wood), Watervliet and Green Island all converge .

What newspapers covering the above area would most likely have had an item about this death?

Family reports that William was a railroad engineer/mechanic. Where could we find info on that ?

Information that we have came from our aunts, who heard it from their father (my grandfather, William's brother), who died in 1946. None of us 25 grandchildren knew our grandfather, or any of his family, as they were all dead long before we were born.

It seems that our grandfather, JAMES FRANCIS REYNOLDS, was the 1st child in his family to be born in the U. S. It is his family that we are researching. This is a bit of a ramble, I know. It's a rainy day, and my sister, Glenda, and I are in the midst of preparation for our trip to Ireland next week. We will be able to see where our family lived before their emigration, be it house, hovel or piece of ground !! Exciting, but emotional stuff.

After speaking highly of my in person purchase about three years ago, I got sticker shock when I went to the South Mayo Research Centre web site yesterday. What cost me €40 then, looks like it might cost me hundreds now, which is not in this retiree's budget. In Mayo two research centres (South and North) have apparently been combined into a single commercial venture headed by the former (present) Prime MInister Bertie Ahearn.

You mentioned FHL films. As you may know, there is a multi-step process of searching an index based on registration districts for a possible event, selecting, ordering (unless in Salt Lake) and then searching the films. I have been faked out and frustrated with this process even when in Salt Lake. As to the index step, local Family History Centers may have Irish indexes as mine does in my small CA beach community.

Hi, again Mike!

My search for my father's Irish born parents and their families in Galway and Mayo was very successful using LDS data as a start.

Between the 1828-1840 tithe records and the 1901 and 1911 census, I was able to find respective family farms and sheep fields using land records. When I made my first and only visit to Ireland in search of my father's dad's grave [he "disappeared" during the depression], I dropped in on an 85-year old namesake whom I knew was not related (at least after 1828). He graciously took me to the local cemetery.

After a thorough but unsuccessful search of headstones, he suggested I talk to the caretaker. A few minutes into the conversation she paused and said "You and my husband are cousins!" My grandfather's sister never left the farm and left behind two families of descendents, most of whom I met that weekend! My kind namesake knew of the relation but didn't want to have to tell me some of the tragic family history, which my cousins did.

I hear from friends that people in Ireland except visits from peopole like us!

Hello, Donna,

I didn't mean to be cryptic about obtaining NYS Dept of Health (DOH) vital records. I'll expound on my routine.

You'll want to know that the NYS DOH records reporting plan began in 1880. The indexes are public record and may be read by anyone. Anyone may order certificates indexed there.

Birth records are available up to 75 years ago, marriages and deaths up to 50 years ago.

I go to the NYS Archives Reading Room, on the 11th floor of the NYS Cultural Education Center, aka the Museum Building. That's one of the four locations where the indexes may be read.

The first time you go there, have your driver's license or passport or some other picture id. You'll have to register the first time and the first time every year.

You'll sign in and a clerk will give you a key to a free locker. You may bring in loose papers and a computer, if you like. You may borrow a #2 pencil, the only writing implement you're allowed to use under archives rules.

You'll sign up to use a microfiche reader. Rarely have I seen anyone not being able to get a reader.

The indexes are in boxes arranged this way:

- + Type of record and range of years are written on the boxes.
- + Year
- + Surnames -- be ready with alternative spellings, as well as soundex codes.

Write down any possibly correct listings with name, place and date and the allimportant NYS registration number.

So, you don't have to have all that information. After all, that's what you're trying to find out. Perhaps that's what you want to learn, and then you can check newspaper obituaries based on the date and place.

When you decide whether and which to order, complete the required form, available on a desk. Write a check for \$22 for each record ordered and stick in an envelope.

Stick the envelope in a dropbox in the reading room. It's taken right to the DOH office and goes into a priority stack. You'll probably get your order in a couple of weeks.

I've been told that even having the information and ordering by mail does not give quick results, perhaps because your order doesn't get into the priority stack, which is just where we want to be.

If you use the information to order from the munipicality in which the event occurred, which is the way vital records are reported in NYS, you still may not get a copy of the original. The crucial NYS registration number does not refer to local registrations.

If there's been a local misadventure, like the legendary fire in the courthouse, the original may exist in the NYS DOH files.

If you can't get to Albany, ask the NYS Archives for names from a referral list of local researchers who have taken the archives' training. You may expect to pay for their research time (and their knowledge of the state) and \$22 for each record ordered.

Combing through the indexes may well result in information about siblings of your target individual, which can only enrich your knowledge.
